I will be spending some time in my report recapping 2023 and the year that was, acknowledging some of our achievements, recognising some of our key people and perhaps touch upon some of our future ideas.

Since our last Annual General Meeting where all Board positions were filled there has been movement within our board, but the results driven members still in place have continued to look forward and put all our efforts into adding value to our members who are the main focus for CHBA. We continue to meet monthly with each Director tabling their portfolios achievements and strategies for the next month. Natalie Ballard continues to help guide our BOM as Secretary and support of our other Directors.

We have Sam Amos as our Administrator, who continues managing the Associations daily running tirelessly. Our finances are being well managed by Michelle Betland.

Our programs have supported the growth of players under the guidance of Coaching Director Felicity Cook with the support of our fantastic volunteer coaches. Rising Suns another successful year Aussie Hoops, Suns Academy (first time ever), Dads and Daughters run by Mat Cook, Domestic and Holiday Programs with Guest Coaches from around the regional areas in NSW. Our Walking basketball program also ran successfully for 4 terms.

Our competitions have now transitioned into clubs with four well supported clubs. BDC Barracudas, Mantas, Narwhals and Seahorses. We also introduced rep player caps and returned players to their own age group which proved positive and showed in the results with a very close and fairer competition. The work behind the scenes by our club delegates and competitions committee has been tireless and amazing to make the vision become a reality. The uniforms look incredible and will be completed with the addition of shorts in 2024. Clubs would not have eventuated without the support of our members who were supportive and flexible with the changes that had to occur for its implementation.

Our major sponsor for clubs Welcome Hospitality Group supported the purchase of the new uniforms and an opportunity to add more financial support with raffles at the 3 venues who are named on the uniforms, Moonee Beach Hotel, Sawtell Hotel and Toormina Hotel.

Another great addition to our association was the recruitment of Neil Goffet as our Operations Manager in October. In November 2023 we announced our new association logo and we welcomed a new life member Justin Baldwin.

I would like to thank our sponsors for all their support of our players, referees and programs, the number of Individual and team sponsors of our representative players and teams was higher than ever before. Without the valuable financial contribution sponsors make to the association, players and teams we would not be able to conduct the programs that we do Your ongoing support has proven vital for many players continuing to play the sport we love and to allow CHBA to continue to provide

opportunities for our kids. I hope that we can continue to foster great relationships with our sponsors and CHBA will continue to strive in improving the ways in which we can look after local businesses and give back to the sponsors that are so willing to assist.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of Natalie Ballard for her work in developing our junior referees to build a base for the years to come. It is exciting to see the growth not only in numbers but the drive to become better referees. Our referees have achieved many fantastic results during the year which is highlighted further in the report.

Adam Jones has also done an amazing job in supporting our referees by gaining sponsorship to assist with the costs of travelling away to referee at representative rounds.

Sportz Central renovations have seen disruptions to our competitions, programs, and rep trainings throughout the entire 2023 being fully closed at some points. Through the hard work of Sam in the office who has liaised with Sportz Central and other venues in our area we have been able to continue all of these in slightly different formats and locations. With Wiigulga opening in late 2022 it has supported some of these changes to our normal schedules. With the refurbishments scheduled to finish in late 2023/early 2024, this short-term pain will result in a great gain, not only an extra court but 3 new regulation sized courts to allow us to host more events in the future, such as Jamboree and more JPL/NEJL rounds. I thank everyone for their patience and support during this time. It has now been confirmed we will be hosting the Jamboree for U12 aspiring State players in 2024.

I would like to thank all those people who have stepped in and assisted myself and the board members, and ensure our members were still able to play this sport we love. The current Board Members have worked tirelessly along with our office staff to ensure CHBA continues to operate on all levels. It is a privilege to work alongside them and see the dedication they have to this Association and community.

In the 2023 Representative Season, our teams achieved remarkable success, showcasing their talent and dedication on the court. Notable highlights include our teams securing runners-up positions in the NEJL Finals for U14W2, U18M1, and U14W1 categories. Additionally, our U12 Men Div 1 and U12 Women Div 1 teams impressed with their 3rd place finishes, while the U12 Women Div 2 team showcased their resilience by achieving 4th place. In the JPL Finals, our U18W1 team's top-four finish in the state reflected their exceptional performance, despite facing tough opponents. Moreover, our U12W1 team's triumph in the State Cup underscored their determination and skill. Overall, these achievements highlight the club's commitment to excellence and the outstanding efforts of our players and coaches.

This will be my last duty as President of CHBA, thank you for the opportunity to help guide this amazing association in a forward direction alongside this amazing group of people on the Board of Management and the Administrative team that steer the ship on a daily basis. Treasurer's Report

Dear Members,

I am happy to report that the association continues this year to be in a sound financial position. The accounts have been audited and the auditor's report is attached.

The financial statements show a loss for the year of \$43,063 compared to a loss of \$20,074 for the year ended 31 December 2022.

Some of the contributing factors to be noted are the higher costs associated with the running of programs and competitions, the significant reduction of court space due to the prolonged closure of back courts during renovations, no active Sporting Schools programs in place and the additional costs associated with hiring extra facilities such as Wiigulga Complex and the University courts have attributed to this.

The Statement of Financial Position maintains a strong net asset position of \$164,376 however this has decreased compared to net assets of \$207,439 last year due to the loss recorded for 2023.

I am pleased with the progress we have and are making as an Association and look forward to an excellent year ahead.

Referee's Report

What a year 2023 has been, one of the major goals of the association was to continue to develop, upskill and boost the number of referees across our domestic and representative portfolio.

The body of CHBA's referees are made up of teenagers from 13 years of age through to 17 years of age. I hope this is something that our domestic senior players will recognise and remember.

Referees are not only learning to develop their skills and education in officiating the game of basketball, but who are simultaneously developing life skills in communication, presence and ultimately, self-confidence, that self-confidence can often be shattered by poor player and or spectator behaviour, please remember these referees are needed for you/your player to play let's be a little bit kinder on and off the court.

Whether you are a player, spectator, coach or fellow referee, please remember to respect your active referees, and take a breath before challenging their decisions in the game.

We had 27 people attend a community referee course at the conclusion of 2022 and early 2023 of those 27 we have been fortunate to have 16 Trainee referees obtained their stripes with a handful to complete their on-court assessments, by the Annual General Meeting date we will have 21 community referees over the 12-month period.

Credit where credit is due our more senior referees have done an amazing job mentoring our trainee referees without your guidance, patience and support our trainees would not have achieved what they have in the time frame they have.

A small handful of members have attended a community course to develop their awareness of the rules of the game, something we welcome any player or parent / spectator to do with no strings attached in becoming a referee, education is the key to ensuring a positive atmosphere for our referees on an off the court.

Making basketball fun and exciting and taking the time to get to know all the players and help them with their confidence and love of the game is such an important role coaches play in our club to breed the next young ballers in our club.

Rising Suns Program was organised by Les Gough and Cristi Juffermans. Head Coach Mat Cook delivered an intensive skills and game based program assisted by David Barry, Laurie Van Loo, Felicity Cook, Adrian Schmidt, Tahlia Amos and Meg Reynolds. The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements.

(a) Cash and Cash Equivalents
Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks,
other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months
or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in
current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Trade and Other Receivables
Trade receivables are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e., cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of trade and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in income and expenditure statement.

(d) Inventories Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of manufactured products includes direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate portion of variable and fixed overheads. Overheads are applied on the basis of normal operating capacity. Costs are assigned on the basis of weighted average costs.

(e) Revenue and Other Incomo Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised over the financial year.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customer.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

- (f) Trade and Other Payables
 Trade and other payables represent the liabilities at the end of the reporting period
 for goods and services received by the association that remain unpaid.
 Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. Trade payables are
 obligations on the basis of normal credit terms.
- (g) Goods and Services Tax (GST) Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.
